

MSTF Hosts Third Annual Radiothon



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Mid-South Transplant Foundation hosted its third annual Organ & Tissue Donor Awareness Radiothon on Aug. 23 in honor of National Minority Donor Awareness Month (August). The Radiothon featured both recipient and donor family panels.

Panelists included kidney recipients Angela Gordon and Keyon Johnson; heart recipient Vera Milam Johnson; lung recipient Belinda Marshall; liver recipient Rev. Dr. Robert H. Washington, Sr., with Harris Memorial CME Church in Memphis and his wife, Memphis City Councilwoman Jana Swearengen-Washington; pancreas recipient Donna Haywood; cornea recipient Caprisha Davis; and donor hero family Amir and Charmagyne Akram.

Panel moderators were Dr. Telisa Franklin, MSTF Multicultural Relations Coordinator and President of the Memphis Juneteenth Festival, Pastor Ricky Floyd with Pursuit of God Church, Evangelist Donnie Briggs and Marceline Williams.

"It's important that the African American community hear from others in the African American community – my community – about donation," Franklin said. "National Minority Donor Awareness Month is the perfect time. I hope everyone who listened to the amazing stories of life and legacy understands how impactful donation is."

Franklin said four members of her family are alive today because of donation. Another

family member is waiting for a kidney.

"There's a lot of misinformation about donation, especially in minority communities. There's a lot out there that just isn't true," Franklin said. "The truth is donation saves lives. I've seen it in my own family. I always tell people the best 'yes' I ever gave in my life was when I gave God my heart and my soul, and my second best 'yes' was when I put that heart on my driver's license."

Mary Beck, MSTF Community Relations Coordinator and one of the event organizers, provided statistics for the MSTF service area, which includes 11 counties in Tennessee, 19 in Mississippi and six in Arkansas. "About 75% of the patients waiting for an organ in the MSTF service area are African American, and 80% of patients waiting for a kidney in our service area are African American," she said. "Just one person waiting is too many. We can help reduce these numbers by becoming registered donors."

Nationally, more than 100,000 Americans are waiting for a lifesaving organ transplant. Roughly, 4,000 of those are in the Mid-South (Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee), and more than 80% of those waiting are waiting for a kidney.

Campaign Honors Local Donor Heroes

The Honoring Local Heroes campaign is a collaboration of MSTF and Tennessee Donor Services (Donate Life Tennessee) along with the Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security. It is designed to honor local donor heroes, recognize local recipients and raise awareness for organ and tissue donation throughout Tennessee. The campaign was launched in June in Lexington and Dyersburg and features posters of donor heroes and recipients. The posters have been installed at Driver Services Centers throughout the state.

"Honoring Local Heroes gives us an opportunity to recognize those who have given the gift of life in their communities," said Zola Burgess, MSTF Community Outreach Coordinator. "The program helps us raise awareness about the importance of donation – the importance of saying 'yes' to donation when you come to get or renew your driver's license. 'Yes' changes lives."

Ninety-eight percent of all registered organ and tissue donors across the country register when they get or renew their driver's license.

MSTF Ambassadors Participate in Transplant Games

Three MSTF Ambassadors, Katie Lea, Amber Pettis and Mimi Smith, participated in the 2024 Transplant Games of America (TGA) in Birmingham, AL, in July. Smith is a liver recipient, and Pettis is a kidney recipient. Lea is a kidney donor.

Smith took part in the 5K Run/Walk, Cornhole and Lyrics for Life. This was her first year at TGA. "Participating in the Transplant Games of America in Birmingham was a huge accomplishment for me two years post-liver transplant," she said. "I was able to complete my first 5K after my transplant. I cried the last mile."

Pettis is a TGA veteran. The 2024 event is her fifth TGA. This year she medaled in nine events within her division and age group: Cycling 5K (gold), Bowling Doubles (gold), Bowling Mixed Doubles (bronze), 4 x 100 Relay (bronze), 100 Meter (bronze), 200 Meter (silver), 400 Meter (bronze), 5K (bronze) and Basketball (silver).

As with Smith, 2024 was Lea's first year at TGA. Lea, who is

Tirst year at IGA. Lea, who is Ambassador Amber Pettis Vice-President, Chief Nursing Officer – University Hospital with Methodist Le Bonheur Healthcare, participated in the 5K. "It was an honor to walk/run with recipients, donor families and members of the community," she said.

"I made new friends that I have remained in contact with since returning. I also met fellow Tennesseans who shared the same passion about organ donation as I do. We are collaborating together for support throughout the state for a Donate Life license plate," Lea said. "I traveled home inspired and even more committed to donor awareness."

Lea said she chose to participate in TGA for several reasons. "Why I chose to participate is multifold: to raise awareness for donation and the impact on patients and families; honor donors and their families; and share my story of being an altruistic kidney donor at 55 years old and living my best life post-donation."
